

The life and legacy of Jim Acheson

April 3, 2023



We are saddened by the loss of our very good friend, James C. Acheson of Port Huron, who passed away on Sunday, April 2, 2023.

Jim had a love of three things: his family, boating, and giving back to his favorite communities of Port Huron, Michigan and Lighthouse Point, Florida. He leaves behind a powerful legacy of enjoying life while ensuring that those programs, projects, and organizations he treasured will endure.

Some of his happiest days were spent cruising the Great Lakes with family and longtime friends, or heading south out of Florida to the Bahamas with more friends.

Jim's Father Howard was one of the founding fathers of the Community Foundation of St. Clair County (known as the Port Huron District Foundation) back in 1944, and was one of its longest serving board members.

Jim carried on his father's legacy of philanthropy and served as a trustee of the Community Foundation from 1972 to 1990. In the late 1990's, Jim began a decades-long period of giving back that is unprecedented in the Foundation's 79 year history.

In recognition of his incredible spirit of philanthropy, Jim received the Russell Mawby Award from the Council of Michigan Foundations in 2004 and then in 2009 he received the Distinguished Service Award (DSA) from the Community Foundation of St. Clair County. Both awards are meant to honor extraordinary lifetime achievement in philanthropy.

He and his team, led by Donna Niester, began an intentional and deliberate plan to dramatically bolster the capacity and professionalism of the Community Foundation. They were a driving force behind recruiting and hiring the first full-time professional CEO, Randy Maiers, in 2002. He also made significant gifts to grow the Foundation's Operating Funds and its Operating Endowment.

Although quite modest in his giving, his support and generosity were responsible for community assets which will endure for generations to come, such as Desmond Landing and the Maritime Center; the Performing Arts Centers at each high school in Port Huron; the Blue Water River Walk, which he gifted to the Community Foundation at Christmas of 2010; Studio 1219, the Youth Home, Community Renaissance Program, and Community Capital Club. He was also passionate in his support for McLaren Port Huron Hospital, Port Huron Police Department, Blue Water YMCA, Port Huron Museum, SONS, Mid-City Nutrition, the Tall Ship Festival, and everything that improved life on the south-side of Port Huron where he grew up.



Port Huron Northern gets new weight room thanks to anonymous donor

May 2, 2023



Thanks to a generous donor from the Community Foundation, the Port Huron Northern High School (PHN) weight room has been refurbished into the Bates-Armstrong Fitness Room. Jim Bates and Barry Armstrong were the 1960s and 1970s football coaches who made a very large impact on students and the athletic climate within PHN.

“The spirit of giving back is very important to this (anonymous) donor who wanted to acknowledge the positive and life-long influence both Coach Bates and Coach Armstrong had on them as a person,” said Jackie Hanton, vice president at the Community Foundation. “This once-in-a-lifetime gift to the school district is a testament to the importance this donor feels about supporting our schools, providing access to fitness equipment for all students and honoring those faculty and staff who do so much.”

PHN’s original weight room was organized by Coach Armstrong and Bates. They were able to persuade the administration to add a “weights and agility” class to the schools’ curriculum. Changing weight lifting from an informal activity done outside of school hours, to a distinctive class period meant for exercise, was a first for the district at the time. This allowed for more students at the school to have access to gym equipment, and for more time to be spent training and learning through exercise.

“The new Bates-Armstrong Fitness Room will allow a more inclusive workout environment,” said Jason Kasparian, athletic director at PHN. He is excited to be able to expand from just weights, into cardio equipment, light workout gear, a low-pressure Woodway Curve treadmill, Kenzie balls, budgie ropes, and turf ground to allow a more realistic training environment.

Jim Bates coached at Port Huron High School before being hired at PHN. He coached for 18 years, retiring with a record of 142 wins for the Huskies. He also helped the Huskies win EML championships in 1970, 1975 and 1976. After resigning from his position as head coach, he became an assistant helping the Huskies win two more championships in 1986 and 1988.

Leading by example, Bates’ positive influence extended to the players, students, teachers and staff. Bates held deep values, maintaining honesty and integrity within his football plays and actions with others. Individuals around Bates admired and respected him. One of Bates many achievements was starting PHN’s junior varsity (JV) football team, allowing for participation in the program to double. Bates helped players spend extra time in the gym and helped host informal games so players could improve.

Later on, Coach Bates became an inaugural member of the Michigan High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame, both in Port Huron and Farmington.

Under the leadership of Jim Bates as head coach, Barry Armstrong became a defense coordinator in 1967. Serving in this position for 14 years, he helped bring great enthusiasm and knowledge to the PHN program. He was greatly respected and admired by his students and colleagues for the changes he implemented into the program, such as changing the Huskies’ defensive scoring tactic from a prolific rushing offense, where the huskies were occasionally outscored, to a tactic 52-slant defense.



This showed immediate results when Huskies won the championship in 1970. The traffic performance on both sides of the ball showed just how profound Armstrong's changes had been. Continuing throughout the '70s his defensive tactics continued to shine, being the best in the league and contributing to two more championships in 1975 and 1976.

Coach Armstrong was inducted into the Upper Peninsula Sports Hall of Fame, and the Soo High School Hall of Fame.

"Jim Bates was the first head football coach and for someone to feel the need to honor him and Coach Armstrong was truly special," Kasparian said. He hopes to continue to expand on the coaches' ideals of "more opportunities within the weight room, and helping people make healthy choices for themselves."

"The new fitness center will allow more students and staff to utilize the expanded space and new equipment that allows for a full range of exercises." Kasparian believes the room is well thought out for all individuals of varying fitness levels. "I am very eager to be able to represent our former football coaches in this way."


The fitness room is utilized multiple times a week by various students and student athletes. PHN's Women's Wellness and Weight Lifting (W3) club, run by advisor Stephanie Cruciano and student President McKenna Kiteley, host exercise time to help increase women's involvement in exercise.

"There are so many more varieties of conditioning and training techniques that we will be able to be put into place because of the new equipment," Cruciano said. "We are super excited about the variety of fitness goals this transformation will be able to help our students meet."

Kiteley added, "I couldn't be more excited and grateful for the incredibly generous gift that will fund the expansion and modernization of our weight room. When I founded Women's Wellness through Weightlifting last year, we identified a small list of equipment that we felt would encourage more female members to the club and now we have that equipment to utilize."

PHN teachers, students and athletes are very happy to honor these amazing coaches and their legacies in the new Bates-Armstrong Fitness Room.

The Community Foundation is proud to be able to connect passionate donors to opportunities that will impact hundreds of student athletes in the years to come.



Marine City Receives Grant for Marina Project

May 9, 2023



Plans for a new Marina, with transient docking, in downtown Marine City have received a significant boost from the Community Foundation of St. Clair County with \$393,000 grant. This latest major funding leverages other recent grants from the DNR Trust Fund, SEMCOG, St. Clair County and the Community Foundation.

“Support for this new marina project in Marine City just keeps growing,” said City Manager Scott Adkins. “The City is excited about how relatively quickly funding and support from our partners has come together – it’s a great asset for the whole community,” he added.

In 2021 the marina project was voted as one of the region’s most important new developments by the Blue Meets Green coalition, which is a large regional group of stakeholders from every sector of the community.

“It’s not very often that a community along the shores of Michigan gets to build a new marina,” said Hale Walker, who is both Board Chair of the Community Foundation as well as Co-Chair of Blue Meets Green. “I recall very strong support from a lot of stakeholders as soon as this project was announced,” he added.

The Community Foundation of St. Clair County attributed this latest grant to their friends and partners at the Ralph C. Wilson Jr. Foundation in Detroit, which has been a significant partner on multiple projects in and around Port Huron and St. Clair County.

The Marine City Marina District Initiative represents a major investment in the region's future creating lasting benefits for the community, environment, and the local economy," said Jim Boyle, vice president of programs & communications, Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Foundation. "The new marina will add another significant waterfront asset to the region and connect it to the larger Bridge to Bay Trail system, further enhancing the area's natural beauty and recreational opportunities. We are proud to partner with the Community Foundation of St. Clair County and the DNR in supporting this project."

The new marina project is a multi-phase initiative with an expected total budget of more than \$1 million. It began in partnership with Six Rivers Land Conservancy and a grant of \$272,000 from the DNR Trust Fund to support the initial purchase of the waterfront property on the south end of downtown Marine City. The City then received funding from both the County and Community Foundation to help cover the costs of demolishing the existing house on the property.

"This latest grant from the Community Foundation and the Ralph C. Wilson Jr. Foundation will help us pay for the upcoming phases of work," added Adkins. He noted that future new amenities such as a pavilion, restrooms, parking lot, seating, walkways and lighting will help to make the space more community friendly and compliment the newly installed ADA kayak/canoe launch across the Belle River. "This generous funding will also allow us to advance our plans to connect the new marina to the Bridge to Bay Trail which runs through our downtown the marina property can be used as a dual trailhead for both non-motorized and waterways trails," he said.

The Bridge to Bay Trail system is the region's largest pedestrian trail and stretches from Algonac up to Lakeport. Several years ago a large coalition of stakeholders, led by the Community Foundation, St. Clair County Parks & Recreation, and multiple municipalities along the trail, launched an ambitious multi-year plan to complete the remaining gaps in the trail system.

"This new project in Marine City will add another amazing waterfront asset and also help us complete the remaining gaps in the Bridge to Bay Trail," said Hale Walker. "This really is an example of the public, private and philanthropic sectors coming together to build up the prosperity and unique assets in our downtowns."



TOP SECRET: LICENSE TO SPY WILL OPEN APRIL 29 AT KNOWLTON MUSEUM

March 7, 2023



The Community Foundation is excited to announce an exciting, hands-on and family friendly exhibit coming to the Knowlton Museum in downtown Port Huron.

“This is an excellent opportunity to engage the community in a different way in the Knowlton Museum space generously donated a couple years ago by the Knowlton family,” said Hale Walker, Community Foundation board chair. “This is our first effort at rotating exciting and hands-on exhibits into the Knowlton Museum space.”

For many years, the Knowlton Museum has housed the Knowlton family ice collection which has been carefully put into storage to make room for Top Secret: License to Spy. The new exhibit is based around a James Bond-style fantasy of exotic locations, high-tech equipment and, of course, a mystery to solve.

Through the task of breaking codes, using spy satellites and creating elusive disguises, this exhibit explores the science and technology of the undercover world of spying and espionage.

Equipped with a Spy File, visitors are presented with a scenario and six suspects. They will be challenged with gathering intelligence from selected exhibits to uncover information on the suspects, leading them on a journey of discovery into the life-like world of what it is like to be a secret agent. Kids and adults alike will be amazed by the behind-the-scenes glimpse into this world in Top Secret: License to Spy.

“We wanted to bring an opportunity to downtown Port Huron for families, school groups and visitors alike,” said Patti Manley, vice chair of the Community Foundation. “The exhibit will build on the entertainment options available downtown, including the new Wrigley Hall.”

The visiting exhibition is a demonstration of how scientific thinking can be used to solve problems in many aspects of everyday life with 21 interactive experiences that explore the science and technology of espionage, including

- Navigating a room full of laser beams without setting off an alarm
- Finding the hidden microphones in a room that has been bugged by watching the reactions on an oscilloscope while tapping various objects around the room
- Using a thumbprint scanner to gain access to satellite technology to pinpoint geographic locations with suspicious activity
- Cracking codes by aligning sections of a transparent combination lock
- Creating a disguise to go undercover
- Using voice-changing technology to confuse enemy agents

“Our hope is to attract school groups from all over our St. Clair County school districts and in neighboring communities that don’t often have a chance to experience a world-class exhibit close to home,” Manley said.

“The STEM focus of the exhibit makes it easy for teachers to match with curriculum requirements and the Community Foundation is working with classrooms who need assistance to afford the trip.”



The Community Foundation is partnering with the Port Huron Museums to ensure an enjoyable experience at Top Secret: License to Spy.

“I couldn’t ask for a better team to help the Foundation bring this exhibit to fruition,” said Jackie Hanton, vice president at the Community Foundation.

“Port Huron Museum staff has been working closely with us to inventory the Knowlton family ice collection and will now help us transition the space for this exciting new exhibit. We’re grateful to have their experience and partnership to bring Top Secret: License to Spy to town the end of April through September.”



Top Secret: License to Spy opens Saturday, April 29, 2023 at the Knowlton Museum, 317 Grand River Ave, and runs through Sept. 5, 2023. 
The time and care that was put into the exhibit and the entire event was very evident and we truly appreciate it.

Impact investing is win-win for community

The Community Foundation is in the business of investing into our local community- downtowns and neighborhoods throughout the county. While best known for grants to nonprofit organizations, another facet of the Foundation's work is through investments into for-profit businesses and economic development in the region.

Known by the industry terms "impact investing" or "mission-related investing", these investments seek a profitable return on the money invested as well as some form of local community impact.

"Most of our assets are invested in the stock market," said Hale Walker, board chair of the Community Foundation. "Which in turn means we're invested in companies and projects throughout America and the world. Those investments then feed our grant and scholarship programs. But one of the most exciting things we do, that not everyone is aware of, is our impact investing; where we take some of those funds out of the market and we invest them locally."

Investing them locally means in businesses throughout St. Clair County.

"We're investing in real people and places... that we can actually see and touch and talk to," Walker said. "People that we know, with businesses that serve our local community and with families that go to our schools."

Past investments have included loans to downtown staples like Anchor Point Bistro and Casey's, as well as larger investments like the \$750,000 loan to St. Clair County Community College (SC4) which helped support the construction of new student dorms in downtown Port Huron.

More recently, the Foundation made a significant investment into the Wrigley Center to support the redevelopment of the former Art Van building in downtown Port Huron into a mixed use residential and commercial gathering place. A \$175,000 pledge from the Community Foundation was matched by our friends at the Ralph C. Wilson Foundation, for a total \$350,000 investment toward the project.

The Wrigley Center, set to open this May, will be home to a variety of businesses and attractions- from food to entertainment to shopping- all under one roof.



“I love how the Wrigley Center is focusing on bringing exciting and unique things to Downtown Port Huron,” said City of Port Huron Downtown Development Authority Director Natacha Hayden. “The Community Foundation’s investment will have a vast economic impact, as it will generate more foot traffic and keep our Downtown vibrant and relevant.”

One of those unique new businesses coming to Wrigley, RenMan Whiskey, is also the beneficiary of the Foundation’s latest impact investment. Aaron Weideman and John Fitzgerald, co-owners/founders of a veteran-owned, patent-pending, online whiskey operation, are opening their first in-person distillery and tasting room at the Wrigley Center. To help with the startup costs of their transition to a brick and mortar establishment they applied for funding from the C3 group, which approved a \$100,000 investment in their enterprise.

While Weideman and Fitzgerald don’t currently live in the city, they say they have always been drawn to Port Huron’s waterfront and are committed to investing in the local community. As a business they are focused on pursuing what they call true profit- a threefold benefit of money, resources and people. For them, that means planting thousands of trees, using grains from local farmers, empowering their employees to give back, and helping to build up other local small businesses.

“The fact that the C3 invested in our company really validated our goal of being influential partners in the community and our mission of rebuilding Port Huron,” Weideman said. “It confirmed that the community is behind us in those efforts, as we pursue the

economic betterment of our community through the sale of whiskey, one glass at a time.”

Like Anchor Point, Casey’s and SC4 dorms, the Wrigley Center and RenMan Whiskey investments have potential for significant impact on the local economy, adding to the development and prosperity of our downtowns, attracting tourists as well as residents. “It’s a win-win for everyone involved,” Walker said. “We’re still investing, we’re just doing it in a more creative, strategic way. Yes, we’re earning revenue, but we’re also gaining the benefits from the local businesses we’re investing in. We’re making our cities and neighborhoods a better place to live in, helping draw more people to the area to eat and drink and shop, and ultimately to live and work.”
